There are two items to report on this month.

1. The SCC committee held its first formal meeting at 6:30 pm prior to the main meeting of 2 April 2018. The main agenda item was management of the members master list.

I am writing to express my enjoyment at meeting other Club members at the Jerrabomberra Wetlands outing, whether for 'landscapes ' or ' birds '.

The day commenced with low light and sparse bird sightings, but soon progressed with the aid of sunshine to reveal an assortment of mostly common birds, such as red rump parrots, magpies and swamp hens. They respectively presented photographic opportunities for the observant.

There was an also assortment of large birds such as Pelicans, Royal Spoonbills and Darters. An endangered water rat was also sighted. Others may have sighted isolated specimens of scarcer birds. Also on offer were kangaroos deciding upon their social standing, i.e. wresting for herd rights.

Not one for seeking rare or scarce birds for their own sake, I sought birds making for photographic opportunities, such as this Dusky Moorhen.





Digital Imaging Special Interest Group

The first DIG SIG was held on 27 March and was attended by about 22 members. The topic of the meeting was an introduction to time-lapse photography.

At the meeting members were also asked to suggest topics for future meetings and volunteer presenters were sought.

The following topics were put forward:

- How to create a panorama
- How to use flash and off camera flash effectively
- Storage and back-up techniques
- Presentation of prints printing and framing
- Blending images (HDR?)
- Hyperfocal distance (best apps for calculating) and how to use effectively in landscape photography
- Creating Lightroom actions
- Demonstration of Color Munki
- Correcting chromatic aberration or white edges or halos due to sharpening or contrast amplification in post processing
- Scanning (digitizing) and restoration of damaged, stained or faded colour and B&W slides and prints – techniques/tips/equipment
- Landscape photography
- Use of neutral density filters
- B&W Photography including the use of Nik Silver Efex Pro

Rob's Printing Service

In October 2017, I bought a large format Epson 7880 printer (can print up to 60 cm wide). It hadn't been used for a long time and consequently had some severe ink blockages but, apart from that was in very good condition. With a lot of work I have returned it to pristine condition and have developed enough experience in using it that I am confident of producing a professional result on a limited range of good quality photo paper.

For an A3 print on Canson Infinity Premium Lustre (a 310 gsm paper) my price is \$20. This includes an initial A5 test print for pre-print inspection to confirm that the print will come out as you expect. If I can't produce an A5 image to your requirement then there is no charge.

The charge for an A2 size print is \$40 with an A4 size test print.

For the moment, I am limiting myself to printing up to A2, but, in the future expect to be able to print up to 60 x 90 cm images.

Luminous landscape

I recently subscribed to the Luminous Landscape web site. It was a bit of an accident in that I was chasing down an article that looked like it could help me with my current project on making printer profiles when, annoyingly, I was blocked from access because it was a subscription only site. Initially this put me off but a few days later I had a look at the site and discovered that it seemed to have a lot more information than just the article that I wanted and a few of the things I read that did have public access seemed interesting. The subscription price is US\$12 per year so even with our poor exchange rate, it is not crippling.

Most recently they have featured an interview with a photographer who is also a pianist and, among other things, he described how he interprets the Ansel Adams comment that "The negative is the score and the print is the performance." and applies it to his prints. It gave some inspirational insights. I also tracked down the article that I had originally wanted and this turned out to be useful too.

LULA seems to have a wealth of resources in its archive and produces some stimulating comments on issues of photography. Worth a try for a year if you are looking for a web site that seems to concentrate on providing quality rather than quantity.

Sirui W2204 tripod review

I've been looking around for a new tripod for a while now. The fact is that I already had three: an old Manfrotto, a relatively newer Manfrotto and an Induro. The Induro was definitely the most rigid of the three and also has the twist locks I prefer, but with the Acratech ball head, it was heavy. It also can gunk up a bit with dirt on occasions and was just a little short.

So, having convinced myself that it was not GAS, but a genuine need, I'd been scanning reviews and came across the Chinese Sirui brand. A few months back I needed (there's that word again) a ball head to replace a Manfrotto unit taht didn't really handle the weight of my Nikon gear and had bought a Sirui, and I'd been impressed with its design and quality. One more tick for Sirui.

I was also interested in carbon fibre, rather than aluminium. Those in the know said that apart from being a little lighter than metal, it was also more rigid and less prone to vibration. Fair enough, but it seemed to be about double the price! The plan stayed on hold.

Then, a few weeks back, Perth retailer Camera Electronic had a 30% off sale of Sirui, and I decided to take the plunge. I'm happy I did. Firstly, it's taller than my other tripods – too tall for me on the flat (even with the centre column retracted), but that will work on downhill slopes. It feels lighter than it actually is, the legs slide in and out very smoothly, and it's very, very stable. Other plusses are that folds down very small, it comes with a tool kit (four more allen keys!), replaceable feet or spikes and a proper bag. I haven't tried its waterproofness yet, but it seems to cope well with Perth's ever-present sand.












