Reports

President's report

One of the pieces of advice you will often hear is to take your time when making a photo. This is often explained as being about getting to know the site, understanding all of the opportunities to take a good photo, and to be critical about what you really want to convey. Another reason is just to ensure that you are using the correct settings for the scene – is the ISO, aperture and shutter speed going to give you the look you want. It's too easy to let the camera do the thinking and maybe come away with some okay photos that might have been better with a bit more thought from the photographer.

Over the last few years I have, for fun, used old 1980s film cameras to take a few rolls of black and white film. Using an old camera has its challenges – no image stabilisation, so you need to take a great deal of notice of your shutter speed. A fixed ISO – if the light drops, the only thing to do is get a tripod. No auto focus – the first thing I think is "why isn't this camera focussing". And of course, no instant review – you need to make sure you get it right in the camera because you can't check it! And of course you need to remember to wind on the film.

There are also benefits – relatively light camera bodies, some superb prime lenses, very clear viewfinders and fantastic manual split screen focussing (once you remember to do it). But the thing I have learned to appreciate is that I need to take much more time than I normally would to think about the scene, what settings I need to use, and how it might be best to shoot it. I am full of respect for the skills of the photographers who shot low light landscapes and amazing nature shots with such limitations. I hope my experience with the old cameras will carry over to the easier world of digital photography.

I was recently approached by a member of the public who donated some of her father's old camera gear to the Club in the hope that someone will use the lenses and other equipment. Elsewhere in this newsletter I have listed the items donated. They are not high end gear, but the photographer looked after it well and the lenses look as good as new. If you are looking for a challenge, try using these old lenses on your digital camera with appropriate adaptors, or even better, with an old film camera. I'm sure you will learn something from the experience.

I sent an email earlier seeking expressions of interest from members to submit a photo for the Club to enter the 2019 Australian Photographic Society's Australian Cup. At present we do not have enough people willing to submit a digital image to allow the Club to enter — because of the size of the Club we must have entries from 20 members. If you are interested but haven't let me know, please do so as soon as possible.

March Dig Sig Report

At the March Dig Sig meeting David Raff demonstrated the impressive ON1 Photo RAW 2019 photo editor and Lightroom alternative.

Just a few of the many very handy features of ON1 covered by David at the meeting include:

- The ability to transfer Lightroom edited photos, keep the non-destructive settings, and move them into ON1. This Lightroom Migration Tool transfers almost every edit you can make in Lightroom including raw processing, crop, retouching and local adjustments along with folders, photos, albums, and metadata.
- The Portrait module, which detects faces and allows one to selectively enhance skin, eyes, teeth and lips.
- The Effects module, which allows one to add an interesting sky or background to a photo with a very boring sky or background.
- Image resizing, which allows one to enlarge photo by up to 1000% without loss of quality.
- The ability of ON1 to process images stored anywhere on the computer or stored in an external drive.










