File recovery

My normal workflow is to put my memory card into a card reader, plug it into my computer and from there directly copy the files into a folder in Lightroom that I create at the time and name suitably. I then check the images in Lightroom and put my card back in the camera where I format the card ready for the next time I use the camera. Within an hour, my Apple Mac will back up the Lightroom images to the Apple backup system.

This process works well but has the risk that if something happens between loading the files into Lightroom and the backup system doing its thing I could have a problem.

Sometimes I forget to transfer the files from a single session and need to separate them into different groups before I load them into Lightroom. On those occasions, I copy the files into a temporary folder on my computer and then load them into Lightroom in groups by photo session. In theory, this should be a more robust process because I should have a copy of the files on my memory card, a second copy in the temporary file, a copy in Lightroom and, a little later, a copy on my backup system. When the files have been copied into Lightroom I delete them from the temporary file to save disk space.

Recently, after trying to take photos of bees on the wing at home, I headed off to ANU to do some preparatory work for the ANU Walkabout on Thursday 16 May. So, having two sets of images that I needed in separate folders, I loaded the whole lot from my memory card into a temporary folder on my computer, put my memory card back into the computer and formatted it ready for next use.

Australian National Botanic Gardens walkabout

A beautiful autumn morning was ordered and delivered for the Walkabout at the National Botanic Gardens that was organised by Helen Dawes. The theme was 'What's in Bloom' with a challenge issued for the best image of the newly constructed Tree House, a very impressive structure and will be enjoyed by many generations of Canberra children.

The Sturt desert pea was in bloom in the Red Centre garden and proved very popular with the photographers, some getting really serious and laying on the ground to get the shot.

The bird population was a bit shy that morning and did not appear for any 'photo shoots'.

There was a discovery of an insect with the strange title of 'Female Yellow Hairy Flower wasp,' which was captured photographically by a few people.

I am sure a photo will appear in this newsletter. The Walkabout ended with coffee at the Pollen Cafe. All in all a very lovely morning so thank you to Helen for organising this.

Then, instead of using Lightroom to copy the images into a permanent location, I started to have a quick browse of the images. I thought I had a lot of competence in file handling on my Mac but, in a strange lapse of concentration and a no doubt extremely clever combination of key presses that I didn't intend, all the files disappeared from the temporary folder. This was a bit surprising but shouldn't be a problem (not with a failsafe Mac), so I went to the menu and selected Edit-> Undo with full confidence that the files would re-appear.

They didn't.

With slightly raised anxiety I decided to look in the Bin (up until the last update of the Apple Operating System, this was, annoyingly, called Trash but it seems that Apple has sensed that I am in Australia and have re-named their trash). But I digress. The files weren't in the Bin either. A quite anxious search showed that they weren't anywhere.

This wouldn't have been a problem if I hadn't got out of sequence and already reformatted the memory card.

The last time I had to recover files was so long ago that I was using a windows computer and I helped recover some data from a friend's memory card. I don't even remember the software that I used.

A google search showed that there is quite a lot of software that recovers files and that you can download this software for free. The fine print reveals that recovery is a two step process: finding the files then letting you see them. The free part is finding. To see the files you have to pay.

In reality, the images I had lost were not particularly important. I can photograph

more bees and I can go back to ANU. But, I thought that it would be worthwhile being prepared in case this sort of thing happened again when I did need to recover important images.

After some more research I couldn't find any free software for a Mac (didn't look for Windows recovery software). Most recovery applications had a one year licence or an infinite licence for an extra \$10. Some offered a discount if you bought a licence for more than one computer. The reviews were inconclusive.

Eventually, I ended up on a site called RecoverIT and took the line of least resistance which ended up costing around A\$150 for a lifetime subscription (I better live a long while).

I paid for and ran the software and it found all the files on my formatted memory card. Quite a lot more than just the images that I had taken that day. I was able to load them (safely this time) onto my computer and copy them into Lightroom.

I expect that there are lots of other options, including cheaper ones, but ultimately I didn't want to try a whole range of software for comparison purposes I just wanted to own some software that I know how to use and can have some confidence that it will get me out of trouble if I have a similar problem again.

An expensive lesson.

However, if you ever have a corrupted memory card, you know who to contact to get get it fixed.


















