29 February 2020: Portrait Interest Group meeting

The February meeting of the Portrait Interest Group was held on the very last day of February at the Australian National Botanic Gardens.

Photographers and models met by the bridge leading to the Garden's Pollen Cafe. The rain forest gully was the chosen setting for the morning's shoot. Despite the hailstorm on Monday, 20 January, the rain forest gully and the gardens more generally

seem to be recovering well and still offer great photographic opportunities whether for portraits, birds, plants or landscapes.

There were four models and three photographers in attendance and we took our time traversing the length of the rain forest gully. The day was generally bright and sunny with dappled light making its way through the canopy. This made for some challenging lighting conditions at times, particularly on the faces of our models. But as we made our way deeper into the gully, this became less of a issue. Towards the end of the shoot, we were fortunate enough to have the misting sprinklers come on at the bottom of the boardwalk. This gave photographers a chance to pose the models in the mist for a somewhat ethereal look.

After about 90 minutes or so of photography, we adjourned to the Pollen Cafe for a well earned coffee and cake with our group parting company at about 12.30.

February Dig-Sig report

A large part of the February Dig-Sig meeting was devoted to establishing what members wanted from these meetings. The following suggestions, in rough order of popularity, were put forward:

- Comparing post-processing software,
- Momento and other personalised photo books, page layout and use of type,
- RAW photo challenge,
- High Dynamic Range (HDR) photography,
- Long exposure photography,
- Filters,
- Focus stacking,
- Photographing birds and other wildlife,
- Presentation of prints and framing,
- Giving and receiving critique,
- Lightroom new features,
- Low light photography,
- Wide angle photography,

Also presented the meeting was a very superficial overview of the photography magazine "Lenswork", the first issue of which was published in 1993.

Lenswork is not a magazine about cameras, equipment and software but is rather about creative aspects of photography.

There was also a short presentation on "Mean Stacking using Smart Objects in Photoshop". This is a useful technique for reducing noise in low light conditions requiring use of high ISO.

The "mean Stacking" technique can also be used to simulate a Neutral Density (ND) filter to create silky smooth waterfalls or streams without the need for a ND filter or tripod. A demonstration and Photoshop workflow of this technique can be seen in the YouTube video by Tony Northrup <u>https:///www.youtube.com/watch?v=YcZkCnPs45s</u> (see from 2:20 min to 7:40 min).

The next Dig Sig meeting is on Tuesday 24 March. The subject for the meeting is creating High Dynamic Range (HDR) Photos.

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Mornington Peninsula–Great Ocean Road trip report

I've not done a lot of travelling and I've watched with envy at Club meetings where members show off their photos from overseas trips or even around Australia: often thinking that I didn't have anything worthy of showing myself.

Thanks to Potter Travel I have finally taken a road trip to one of the places I have longed to visit: an eight day bus trip to Mornington Peninsula and the Great Ocean Road.

Potter Travel make all the arrangements regarding destinations and local sightseeing so there is really not any opportunity for alternatives apart from limited spare time each afternoon or very early morning (in the vicinity of the accommodation), and visits to the varied 'attractions' were often time limited and rushed. Nevertheless, for someone without alternative transport options, it was a way to see a part of the country I'd not yet seen and I enjoyed the trip as a whole.

Plans for our first night's stop at Lakes Entrance had to be changed due to the December fires so we stayed at Bright instead. We then had two nights at Flinders on the Mornington Peninsula before taking the ferry from Sorrento to Queenscliffe, and on to Geelong for the night.

The highlight, and the main purpose of my trip, was of course the Great Ocean Road, for which I was lucky enough to have an ocean-side window seat. Absorbed by the coastline, I almost forgot to look across the other side of the bus to see the rolling greens hills alternating with lush green sheep or cattle pastures. Such wonderful country.

The second highlight of the trip was our two night stay at Warrnambool. Our motel was just a short walk from the Merri River, which flows out into the ocean and passes Middle Island. Middle Island is perhaps best known from the movie Oddball, in which (in a true story) a Mareema dog saved a rare penguin colony from extinction. At the time there were fewer than 10 penguins left. The Mareemas continue to guard the colony and it has grown to 180 birds.

The first morning I managed to take some wonderful photos of the rising sun throwing a golden glow over the rocks of the island, and the river at low tide.



For some reason, the light didn't give the same results the following morning but I was delighted to see one of the Mareemas on Middle Island and get a photo of it. It looked so forlorn and lonely.



A wooden bridge crosses the river and continues on to a long walk around the headland. I just wish I'd had time to complete the whole walk.



We were also treated to a night light show at the Flagstaff Historical Maritime Museum, which partly told the story of the ship wreck of the ship Loch Ard, for which the gorge along the Great Ocean Road was named.

More photos in the F22 gallery, and I hope to do more trips.









