I'd like to thank Shane Baker, our WA member, for offering to present for this first meeting on Capture 1, an alternative photo-editing software to Photoshop and Lightroom. His presentation will be a live demonstration of the features of Capture 1, which he will do using the screen sharing function on Zoom. It does have some limitations as it can be a bit slow but, when we trialled it, it worked well.

An email was sent out to members on 2 May 2020 about the meeting. An invitation to attend the 14 May Southside Camera Club meeting through Zoom will be sent to members a couple of days before the meeting. We will also be running a Show and Tell after the presentation. Advice on how to submit photos for this are provided in the email. So come along and bring your coffee and biscuits.

Another new initiative for the Club is the Focus Project, a monthly project and website gallery for Southside Camera Club members, set up during the coronavirus shutdown when we cannot hold regular meetings. Cotter Bend





On The Perch aviary at Tathra

In made two visits to the On The Perch aviary at Tathra between the bush fires and the general Covid shut-down, i.e. in March of this year.

The aviary had walk-in facilities. The inclusions had natural surroundings as far as possible, including realistic shallow pools for the birds' drinking and bathing. The roof netting was low to facilitate close, contact with the birds. There was a range of not commonly seen birds, including two families of Bush Stone Curlew in separate areas.

The owner said he had endured two close calls from bush fires within two years. No doubt news of the then emerging virus scare also weighed upon the owners' minds.

That being so, I visited the aviary twice within the week prior to closure. Twice because the first visit was characterised by wet conditions and low light.

I enjoyed being at one with the birds, which were necessarily very accustomed to human presence. The facility was unique in its range of accessible birds in natural surroundings. Black Fronted Finches, Golden Finches bathing in shallow water, Regent Bower Birds, Orange Chats and delightful birds such as Wood Swallows were all available to feed from the hand, land on the hair (for nesting material?) or to merely observe or photograph.

My regret is that I was slow to recognise the availability of such a top class aviary nearby to Canberra.

I obtained many hundreds of photos, which would be otherwise be very difficult to obtain.


