I've loved photography as far back as I can remember, with portraiture and landscapes probably my major interests.










Seascape







My main focus in photography this year has been birds of prey, particularly the Wedge-tail Eagle. I am in awe of these magnificent birds and astounded by the emotion being close to them evoke in me. I am not alone in this. Many bird photographers readily admit shaking so much at a close encounter that the photos are blurred. What is it that makes us react this way, is it the sheer size of them, the power they have or the way they can soar effortlessly in the sky and in a gale stay motionless for long periods. The two images selected show the difference in the juvenile to an adult eagle, predominately this is the light colouring. An eagle takes a number of years to acquire its full adult plumage and with the females being generally lighter in colour but larger in size.






















In 2019 Robin and I travelled to the UK,

geographical gems Sicily has to offer.






