Didn't do his lens a whole lot of good! But the guy on the right with the weird hair and a cigar became a celebrity for about 15 minutes.



The thought, planning and time that goes into some of his photographs makes me appreciate how little I deserve to get a really stunning shot as I definitely do not go to the extent he does. Towns Near Me - Binalong and Boorawa

July Portrait Interest Group: Queanbeyan Central Park

We met at 10:00 am on a cool but windless winter's day and despite the prediction of rain we fortunately saw no sign of it during the morning. Ten people attended the outing, three models, six photographers and one observer.

We took turns working with individual models in the park, posing them to make a variety of images. After about an hour we moved across the road to a beautiful old church where we posed the models using the church wall as a backdrop. One of the church congregation members, who was working in the garden, had kindly given us permission to come onto the property for the photography.

It was a cloudy day with lots of clear sky resulting in frequent bright contrasty light — a serious challenge for portrait photography. A variety of techniques were used to soften the shadows in our photography, including: flashlights, facing the model away from the sun and having the model stand in the shade of a nearby tree.



I experimented with on-camera flash using my new flash bracket (the Manfrotto 233B), which, though rather heavy, can conveniently keep the flash way off to the side of the camera. I had some good practice using this technique though I didn't have great success with most of the images.

We had lots of fun, chatting throughout the morning while carrying out what was often really challenging photography. We finished at around 11:30 when we headed into town for a cup of coffee. We sat outside at tables on the sidewalk, relaxed, chatted some more and agreed to meet at the Kingston Foreshore next month with a theme of hats for the modelling.

A new toy for Rob

I had always assumed that part of photography with a tripod was a droopy lens on the ball head. I Googled this phrase and it produced 122 million references. I am not alone and, at least the first few Google pages mostly seemed to talk about better technique, more expensive ball heads or ways for aiming a little high to compensate for the inevitable droop.

I have tried all these things without success but a few years ago saw an alternative solution when I attended a seminar run by Les Walkling at PhotoAccess. Les is a renowned photographer, printer and teacher. He also uses expensive gear and the bit of gear that caught my eye was the Arca-Swiss cube that sat under his Hasselblad medium format digital camera.

I had already converted to an Arca-Swiss style L bracket so that I could mount my camera horizontally or vertically on my ball headed tripod so the cube seemed like a great opportunity because it eliminated the droop problem — until I saw the price on the B&H web site. The <u>Arca-Swiss cube</u> might solve the camera droop problem but the wallet and facial droop problem was insurmountable for me.



There is no doubt that this is a serious bit of equipment and will hold a load much heavier than any of my camera/lens combinations, but the price ...

The advantage of the cube is that the knobs turn the camera using fine gears so that the camera can be aimed with great precision. The adjustments are plus or minus 30 degrees horizontally and

vertically plus a 360 panorama for left and right movement.

A bit of research showed that a few other companies made geared heads and, eventually, I bought a Manfrotto Junior 410 geared head. It is more functional than the Arca-Swiss cube in that it can move through a wider arc in all directions, but I found it difficult to use. It also used a unique and huge release plate that didn't accommodate the L plate on my camera. I solved the L plate problem by buying an adapter from Chris Hejnar, who sells innovative camera products on eBay and through an online store. But, I knew it wasn't what I wanted when I replaced it on my tripod with my best, but slightly droopy, ball head.

Earlier this year our former president, Shane Baker, sent me an email with a video about a new geared head made by the Chinese firm, Sunwayfoto. The model is called the Sunwayfoto GH-Pro 11 Geared Head. While not cheap, it is a lot cheaper than the Arca-Swiss cube and also looked like it was a lot easier to use than my Manfrotto. The Australian retail price is about \$430 so I started saving. A couple of months ago I saw an ad on AliBaba for this head at A\$361 including postage. I bit the bullet and sent off my money. The downside was that the delivery time was 6 weeks away.

Two weeks after I sent off my order I saw an ad in Amazon for the same product another \$40 cheaper. It was an Amazon special that only lasted a couple of days, but was too late for me.

The six weeks seemed to take forever, but it arrived in time for my trip to the Googong foreshore and, without reservation, I can say it is a pleasure to use. I can see myself using it for a lot more panorama shots, and especially HDR panorama shots.
