

#### Treasurer's report

At the 8 October 2020 Treasurer, Tim Heenan, presented the Club's Financial Statement for FY19–20, which had been approved by the Club Auditor on 28 July 2020.

Mark set up the Club lights in his studio in the garage, which we used together with ambient light and on-camera speed lights. Some models dressed in Halloween outfits that they were planning to wear for parties in the evening — if they weren't cancelled due to rain.

Time passed quickly and it didn't seem long before Mark came round taking coffee orders. Shortly thereafter, we finished off our shooting and moved to the dining room for coffee and pastries... and a long chat.

We agreed that our last meeting for the year in November should have a touch of Christmas spirit. We will meet at Tidbinbilla Nature Reserve (weather permitting, of course) and bring along refreshments and a few snacks to share in a picnic style after the photoshoot. The theme for models will be 1950s summer fashion including bright floral dresses.

#### October Dig-Sig report

At the beginning of the meeting members were asked their thoughts about these Dig-Sig meetings and for suggestions for future directions. A few comments/suggestions were:

- consider changing the name Dig-Sig to something more meaningful;
- some members valued the smaller size of the Dig-Sig meetings (compared with the main club meeting), which allows for more discussion; and
- some said they would like the meetings to be more hands-on/practical. Examples of hands-on activities suggested were (i) creating a panorama photo and (ii) using the different camera modes (M, A, S, P, Auto).

I indicated that the role of the Dig-Sig convenor was up for grabs but since no one stepped forward I indicated that I was willing to continue in this role for 2021.

This was followed by a RAW photo challenge where volunteers were asked to post-process/edit the same RAW image prior to the meeting then to show the edited photo and the individual adjustments made to arrive at the finished image.

The following photo editing software were demonstrated: ON1 Photo RAW (David), Luminar 4 (Gabe and Vera), Capture One (Shane), Darktable (Dennis) and Adobe Lightroom Classic (myself).

I would like to thank each of these for taking the time and effort to demonstrate how they edit a photo using their choice of software and special thanks go to Shane Baker, who went to great lengths to create an excellent, 18 minute video showing his use of Capture One to edit the image.

Two interesting observations from this RAW photo challenge were: (i) some photo editing software incorporates Artificial Intelligence (AI), which was used by some to generate a "starting point" from which they worked rather than working straight from the original RAW image, (ii) it's not easy editing someone else's photo because you have no idea what the original scene looked like so some were cautious in their approach while others used artistic licence to add things that were not present in the original photo.

Unfortunately, patchy mobile coverage and our diversions onto side roads, meant they were too far towards Jugiong and too early for more coffee when contact was made so headed back to Canberra.

Capturing interesting scenes with large expanses of a single colour in bright sunshine presents its challenges and the trip gave us practise in using our cameras' features to beneficial effect. Also Helen's Lensball ("perfect crystal for wide-angle photography") mounted on her tripod allowed us to experiment with upside-down, 180° images we could 'right' later, added a bit of fun.





Jugiong was awash with cars and their passengers when we drove in for a latish lunch at the Long Track Pantry. I think we would all recommend stopping there for a lunch if in the area.

#### The dilemma: to buy local or on-line?

I've heard some members say that they won't buy camera equipment from, for example, Ted's Camera store, instead opting to buy on-line at cheaper prices.

Online purchase is fine for cheaper and less available items but a recent experience has made me a firm believer in buying expensive equipment from local retail stores. Ted's is now Canberra's only dedicated camera store and last year I bought an expensive camera from them, opting to also purchase their extended warranty package. I'm glad I did.

I recently placed this camera on my coffee table to take out the battery for recharging. I'm always conscious of dangling camera cords but on this occasion I took the battery out and as I reached over to put it in the battery charger I heard my camera fall to the floor before I had the chance to go back to lift the dangling cord on to the table. I realised my two 2-year-old dogs had just charged through and caught the camera cord as they passed.

At first I thought the camera was fine but I soon learned that both the lens and camera mount were damaged. Not only was this going to be expensive to repair but the timing couldn't be worse since I was about to head off on a five-day bird watching trip and this was my bird camera kit.

This is where the advantage of buying local came into play. I was able to immediately take the camera and lens to Ted's where they were able to look up my records. The advantages were:

 they would send the gear off to Canon for assessment and repair so I didn't have to package it up myself;

- buying the extended warranty entitled me to a 'loan' camera but since they didn't have an equivalent, they luckily had an identical lens brought in for resale. For a (hefty, but refundable) deposit they were able to loan this lens to me while mine was being repaired; and
- 3. they were able to reprint the purchase dockets needed by my insurance company for proof of purchase.

Last year I checked the small print of my policy and found that there is an upper limit per item for replacement value unless the item is listed separately on the policy (worth checking the small print of your policy). Fortunately, I had listed both items separately on renewal of my policy. I was therefore covered for the full replacement cost of both items should that be the case.

The repairs totalled almost \$1800 but my insurance covered this cost apart from the \$300 excess.

In conclusion I figure that the buying the additional warranty, not having the hassle of dealing with Canon regarding the repairs, looking for receipts, and being able to get a loan lens is well worth the additional cost of buying local retail.


It was not ideal as I didn't have my best camera, but at least had a good lens for my bird watching trip.


