The Club lighting kit was put to good use with the two Elinchrom lights being able to be used independently, one with a soft box and the other using a silver reflective umbrella producing different lighting effects. Several Club members had not previously used the lighting kit so it was a good opportunity to try it out.

This might be a good time to remind members that the lighting kit remains an under utilised piece of Club equipment. The

kit is very simple to use and I encourage members to make use of it, particularly at this time of year with so many family gatherings happening.

Other remote lighting kits and on camera flashes were also in use making for a very busy session. With the rain having stopped by late morning, we were even able to get out into the garden for a few shots in the watery sunlight.

Astro photography group 2022

Best times for astro Milky Way photography 2022

Generally we look to the new moon date and work the moon set and rise times from there.

January - new moon, 3 January

The best time is between 27 December 2021 and 6 January.

The Milky Way too low in the SE: the morning blue hour starts at 4.05 am and core rises at sunrise around 4.24 am.

January–February - new moon, 1 February

The best time is between 23 January and 6 February.

The Milky Way core low SE, am blue hour starts at 4.45 am, core rises around 2.30 am.

February–March – new moon, 3 March

The best time is between 24 February and 8 March.

Milky Way core ESE, am blue hour starts at 5.23 am, core rises around 12.33 am.

March-April - new moon 1 April

The best time is between 26 March and 6 April.

Milky Way core ESE, pm blue hour finishes at 8.30 pm, core rises around 10.35 pm.

April-May: new moon 1 May

The best time is between 24 April and 6 May.

Milky Way core ESE, pm blue hour finishes at 6.47 pm, core rises around 7.29 pm.

May-June: new moon 30 May

The best time is between 24 May and 4 June.

Milky Way core ESE, pm blue hour finishes at 6.30 pm, core rises around 6.17 pm.

June-July- new moon 29 June

The best time is between 22 June and 3 July.

Milky Way high in sky, pm blue hour finishes at 5.45 pm, core rises around 6.06 pm.

July-August: new moon 29 July

The best time is between 20 July and 3 August.

Milky Way high in sky, pm blue hour finishes at 6.18 pm, core rises around 5 pm.

August-September: new moon 27 August

The best time is between 20 August and 2 September.

Milky Way high in sky, pm blue hour finishes at 6.06 pm, core rises around 5 pm.

September-October: new moon 26 September

The best time is between 17 September and 2 October.

Milky Way high in sky, pm blue hour finishes at 7.28 pm, core rises around 3 pm.

October-November: new moon 25 October

The best time is between 15 October and 29 October.

Milky Way high in sky, WSW, pm blue hour finishes at 7.54 pm, core rises around 3 pm.

November-December: new moon 24 November

The best time is between 24 November and 29 November.

Milky Way high too low WSW.

ANBG Photographic Group Exhibition: Recovery'

ANBG Visitors Centre Gallery | 25 November – 12 December

Recovery is the eighth annual photographic exhibition by the Friends of the Australian National Botanic Gardens Photographic Group.

This year there are four categories of images. Firstly, there are plant portraits of a single plant, or group of primarily the same species. Then there are wildlife images (in the Gardens, but also outside due to access restrictions this year). Next there are creative compositions of banksia plants in recognition of Joseph Banks' visit to Australia and the new banksia garden. And, to complete the show, images of rare, threatened or endangered plants. In total, there are 48 prints by 20 artists,

all framed in a light-coloured timber and, so, the overall exhibition looks cohesive.



The exhibition successfully displays in print aspects of our beautiful natural environment through the camera lens, and on screen with revolving images of plants, birds and animals in the ANBG.

Wishing you all the best for the holiday season and better shooting opportunities next year.












