Adobe subscription software – my opinion

I have resisted for years to succumb to Adobe's ransom subscription model of their software. I get why they have the subscription model but I still believe there are alternatives for the amateur home user. However, I finally capitulated my stance after buying a mirrorless camera, since the RAW files can't be read by my current software (as with two other 'newer' cameras) and subscribed to Photoshop and Lightroom. I don't do a lot of photo editing and usually only do moderate changes in Camera RAW.

I'm sure other users won't agree with me but I have to say that I am NOT impressed. For a start, the 'new' Adobe Bridge is slow to respond to loading 'high quality images' and often stops working. I can't find the graduated filter option that was available in the earlier version of Camera Raw.

The Save as .jpg in Photoshop is no longer available, but available as Export to: however, it strips all GPS metadata. Since many of my photos are to report to Canberra Nature Map the GPS data is essential so images have to be Exported as Save to Web to include the GPS data. I've set the new camera to record images as RAW and the lowest level jpg. Experimenting with the save options I've found that exporting the RAW file images in the latest software as Save to web, the results are more pixelated than editing the low res jpg in CS6 and saving as .jpg. Really!!! Canberra Nature Map doesn't require hi-res images so I find I use the older software that does easily retain the GPS data when editing sightings to post on this web site, and as tested, actually produces better images.

I have another issue. When 'exporting to .jpg' I get the message that I am not authorised to perform the function as an override of the original file name. I have to give the exported file a new name. I don't have to do this in CS6.

The latest Photoshop has also been less successful with photo merge at times. How can the new software be worse than software developed six or seven years previously?

I'm annoyed at the constant Camera RAW reminders to 'compact my files now' each time I open files to edit in Camera RAW, as it takes too long when I want to edit a photo, but can't find the menu option to do this once I stop working and want to compact the files.

There are other niggling annoyances that mean I find myself reverting back to the CS6 software versions where camera RAW recognises my camera or when I want to save a photo to post to the web and only resort to the subscription model when using a newer camera for which I want hi-res edits that don't require GPS data.

As you may be able to tell: I DON'T LIKE CHANGE and I don't like the new software. I've not yet found an advantage. (I've yet to test saving images as jpg or tiff in both software options (RAW vs low res jpg).) To add to this, I have recently been having problems with my older Adobe Acrobat software. It has been nonresponsive when trying to open it or any PDFs and I have had to constantly 'repair' the software for it to work. Out of frustration I felt I had to buy the latest version, but once again felt like Adobe is blackmailing me into upgrading.

However, there again seems to be a problem. I've not had time to fully investigate, but when trying to print a PDF document I set the printer option to print double-sided, but no matter how many times I tried this, the printing came out single-sided, thus wasting paper. Haven't yet tried printing other documents or the same document from the previous version of Acrobat.

I just wonder how long it will be before I have the same problem with Adobe InDesign, the software I use to produce this newsletter. I own the full Master Suite CS6. I DO NOT want to have to subscribe to the whole Adobe package software. THAT, I will not be able to afford as a home user.

Can anyone explain?

For years I have had a Canon 100-400 mm lens for which I also have a 1.4x converter. My understanding is that with the converter, this would equate to a maximum focal length of 640 mm. I now have some doubts.

Having just purchased a mirrorless camera with a Canon 100-500 mm lens, I was able to do some comparisons. The results below don't seem to make sense. All photos were taken from the same spot on my back deck at maximum zoom and have not been resized.

Review-ette of the Neewer multifunctional phone clamp

While I'm much happier with my Nikon when doing photography or videography, it's nevertheless true that your best camera is the camera you have with you — and I always have my iPhone. Additionally, I recently upgraded my iPhone to the iPhone 14 and in the process, acquired quite decent still and video cameras, which can shoot raw!

However, just like a 'real camera', the iPhone needs a stand at times, and so I recently had a little wander around the interweb and found the Neewer Multifunctional Phone Clamp (PA002).

According to Neewer, the clamp has:

- Unbeatable compatibility: Adjustable from 6.6 to 10.2 cm, this aluminum alloy smartphone tripod mount is compatible with iPhone 14 Pro Max iPhone 13 Pro Max X Xs Max XR Samsung Galaxy S22 Ultra Google Pixel 7 Pro Sony Xperia Xiaomi OnePlus Oppo, and other brands on the market;
- flexible 360° Adjustment featuring a 360° ball head and three vertical tilt notches, the smartphone tripod mount allows you to not only aim your phone at any angle but rotate it vertically or horizontally. The large knurled locking knob helps you adjust and secure the phone clamp with minimal effort;

- Arca type base for tripod mounting designed with an Arca type base, the smartphone tripod mount can be attached to a compatible quick-release plate, or it can mount on a tripod, monopod, light stand, handgrip, and other supports via the 1/4" and 3/8" threads;
- Easy accessory connection: with one cold shoe and three 1/4" mounting points, you can connect a small LED video light, a mini microphone, an articulating arm, and other accessories for a professional vlog setup
- Integrated foldable stand: A folding stand is incorporated into the smartphone tripod mount and transforms the mount into an independent desktop stand for video calls, selfies, remote working, and live streaming.

While I am yet to use it in anger, I can confirm that the clamp feels solid. The knobs all turn smoothly, it easily accommodates my iPhone 14 Max in its clamp, it's stable on a flat surface with my fairly hefty phone and it is indeed Arca-Swiss compatible, while having the threaded holes to mount on a standard tripod.


