Printing: Where to start in 2024

When I converted from film to digital in around 2007 I also bought a Canon all in one 5 colour printer. It did a reasonable job and produced very saturated colours but it didn't take long before prints started to fade. Ink, in small cartridges, was expensive and if I used anything other than Canon printing paper the colours were never as good. This printer didn't clog very often because it was also used as a home printer and my then student daughter was using it just about every day.

Looking for a better printer has taken me down many rabbit holes to many dead ends until now when I own an exceptionally good A2 printer – an Epson P906.

Recently I came across a <u>video</u> singing the praises of an Epson 8500 and it caused me to think that if I was starting on the journey of learning about printing that this printer, or its bigger brother the A3 size Epson 8550, would be a very good place to start.

The Epson 8500 addresses most of the shortcomings that I have experienced. First the ink cost is significantly reduced because it is filled with bulk inks. The colours are a mix of pigment and dye inks with a photo black (PK) for glossy photo printing, a matte black (MK) for printing on copy paper, a gray ink (GY) for enhancing mid tones and gray scale transitions. The other three inks are cyan (C), magenta (M) and yellow (Y). This combination provides a decent size gamut that is more than enough for most prints on glossy paper. Epson has a lot of experience in mixing gray ink with other colours to improve their accuracy and especially to enhance mid-tone colours.

The Epson 8500 and 8550 are both multifunction printers so they can be used as scanners and copiers and therefore can be used to replace a general purpose home printer. The copy and scan features are limited by not having paper feeds but they will duplex print.

I can't comment on the longevity of prints because I haven't used one of these but in a second and much longer <u>video by</u> <u>Keith Cooper</u> he says positive but not definitive things about print longevity. He also recommends printing on glossy paper rather than matte paper with this printer. In his opinion it is better on glossy than matte.

Using Epson paper for printing is a good place to start but you are not limited to Epson. Canon provides Epson 8500/8550 printer profiles for a wide selection of its papers (both glossy and matte).

A final observation is that if this printer is used as a household or home office printer its more frequent use will reduce the risk of blockages that is the blight of all inkjet printers.

If I was taking the first steps of learning about printing now, instead of more than 10 years ago, then the Epson 8500/8550 would be where I would start. It could easily be as much as

I need. I am pleased to talk about printing to anyone who wants to follow up this article.

Vale Elliott Erwitt

Elliott Erwitt (26 July 1928 – 29 November 2023) was a Frenchborn American advertising and documentary photographer known for his black and white candid photos of ironic and absurd situations within everyday settings. He was a member of Magnum Photos from 1953.

Erwitt served as a photographer's assistant in the 1950s in the United States Army while stationed in France and Germany. After moving to New York in 1948, he met the photographers Edward Steichen, Robert Capa and Roy Stryker. Stryker, the former Director of the Farm Security Administration's photography department, hired Erwitt to work on a photography project for the Standard Oil Company. He then began a freelance photographer career and produced work for Collier's, Look, Life and Holiday. Erwitt was invited to become a member of Magnum Photos by the founder Robert Capa in 1953.

Again and again he has also documented socio-political events in his photographs, such as Richard Nixon's visit to the Soviet Union in 1959, the funeral service for John F. Kennedy in 1963 or the inauguration of Barack Obama in 2009.

One of the subjects Erwitt has frequently photographed in his career is dogs: they have been the subject of five of his books, Son of Bitch (1974), To the Dogs (1992), Dog Dogs (1998), Woof (2005), and Elliott Erwitt's Dogs (2008).

Erwitt was awarded the Royal Photographic Society's Centenary Medal in 2002 in recognition of a sustained, significant contribution to the art of photography, a Royal Photographic Society Honorary Fellowship in 1996 and the International Center for Photography's Infinity Award, Lifetime Achievement category, in 2011.



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
